

KGPS has a growing collection of decodable texts available for students to use. They are us<mark>ed in</mark> whole class, small groups and individual reading activities.

Decodable texts are reading materials specifically designed to align with the phonics skills and lettersound relationships that students are learning. These texts predominantly feature words that can be "decoded" or sounded out using the phonetic rules that students are being taught. They help students practice applying their phonics knowledge to read words and sentences, which is a critical step in becoming fluent readers.

Decodable texts provide opportunities for students to practice the phonics rules they're learning. Since the words in decodable texts are carefully chosen to be phonetically regular, students can experience success in reading. This boosts their confidence and motivation to continue reading.

Decodable texts are organised in a structured progression, introducing new phonics patterns gradually.

Teachers at KGPS use decodable texts to meet the needs of our various learners. Teachers choose texts that match students' current phonics abilities, enabling differentiated instruction. Decodable readers are used in classroom literacy groups, reading intervention and can be found in the take home readers boxes.

Our collection of decodable texts is growing and we are excited to be able to offer online readers to further support our students.

Next week, students will have access to 100's of online readers through Decodable Readers Australia.


