Little Learners Love Literacy




- Program used in the Prep-2 area
- LLLL is an explicit and sequential phonics program for teaching children to read, write and spell




Builds:

- phonemic awareness
- phonics understanding
- handwriting
- reading fluency
- vocabulary
- comprehension
- morphology

What does our Literacy block look like?



- We explicitly teach phonemes (sounds) and corresponding graphemes (letters) and teach children how to blend these phonemes together to read words
- Incorporate reading, writing, letter formation and spelling



Ally Talk

- We use a puppet, Ally the alligator, who can only speak in sounds
- Develops their phonemic awareness skills with segmenting and blending practise



Decodable Books

- Decodable readers are used for beginning readers until children have mastered the alphabetic code
- They are carefully sequenced to match our teaching sequence. Children are only asked to read words with the sounds and rules they have been taught
- Families will also have access to Decodable Readers Australia online



Nessy

Reading & Spelling Program





- Online program that helps children develop
- their reading and spelling skills through engaging games and activities
- The program uses a systematic synthetic phonics approach which benefits all students, including those with dyslexia and learning difficulties
- Children are given an individualised learning plan to progress through at their own pace
- Children can use their individual login at home as well as at school



- Readers come to and from school every day
- Aim for 10-15 minutes of practise at home
- Home reading should be a positive and enjoyable experience
- It is helpful to set aside time to both listen to your child read (to develop

their reading skills) and to read to your child (to develop their vocabulary and comprehension skills)



Reading at Home




- The readers children bring home should not be too hard to read
- They are designed to give your child an opportunity to improve their fluency and decoding skills while reading for confidence and enjoyment
- Rereading is great for developing fluency.
 The more times the better!

Reading at Home

- If your child is stuck, encourage them to track with their finger and sound out the word
- Heart words (high frequency) often don't have regular spelling patterns and can be trickier to sound out
- Use the sounds when helping your child. Letter names can cause confusion in the early stages
